It is my pleasure to present you with the Winchester Fire and Rescue Department's 2023 Annual Report. Our organization is comprised of volunteer and career members that are ready to serve their community 24 hours a day, seven days a week. We are benefactors of unwavering support from our City Council, the city leadership team, our fire and rescue foundation, key community stakeholders, and most of all our great community members. Our successes over the past year would not have been possible without all of you. The safety, health and wellness of our community members remains our number one priority, and we strive to accomplish this by providing excellent emergency services delivery and prevention efforts through our many risk reduction offerings. We look forward to continuing this effort in 2024 as we increase operational staffing, build infrastructure, and enhance some of our programs to reach even more of our community members.



In 2023, we held another career recruit academy to bolster the number of firefighters we have to provide service as service delivery demands increase. Additionally, our volunteer staffing levels are on the rise through the efforts of our volunteer administrators and members, and the recent addition of a fire academy class at the Innovation Center. Our partnership with Handley High School is already yielding results to increase numbers in our volunteer membership. Several infrastructure projects are underway. We have ordered another ambulance and our first city owned fire engine to replace some aging apparatus in our fleet. A new city fire station continues through the design phase and we hope to break ground on the current South End site by the end of 2024. A new Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system project is in the review phase as we look to replace our antiquated system that is nearly three decades old! This new system will benefit our entire public safety team and streamline responses to our community members when a call for assistance is received.

We continue to address the many action items in our department's strategic plan to evolve the fire service in Winchester. Several items have reached completion and many more are ongoing. We will continue working on action items within the document as we continually evaluate data on service delivery demands, staffing levels, infrastructure and risk reduction activities. Thank you again for supporting our fire service in Winchester!

Organizational Overview

The Winchester Fire and Rescue Department (WFRD) is comprised of one city owned and three volunteer owned fire stations that are strategically located throughout the city. Volunteer personnel consist of administrative and operational personnel that run their organizations, conduct weekly fundraising and/or ride the fire and rescue apparatus. The WFRD staffs the four stations with 74 career fire and EMS certified personnel. The station personnel work a 24-hour (on) / 48-hour (off) schedule with a fixed "Kelly Day" every three weeks. The department also has administrative support staff, a logistics officer and a Community Risk Reduction Division. WFRD works in collaboration with our four volunteer organizations to provide staffing, facilities, training, apparatus and equipment that serves the Winchester community.

Station #1—Friendship

The Friendship Fire Company is located at 627 North Pleasant Valley Road in Winchester. Friendship provides engine company coverage, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) transport and is first due to the north and eastern sections of the city.



Fire and Rescue Incident Response Information

The Winchester Fire and Rescue Department continued it's mission to provide excellent service to our citizens, visitors and those traveling through our city. Calls for emergency service saw a slight downturn in 2023 due to a number of positive factors including our Community Paramedic Program, revisions to Mutual Aid agreements and our risk reduction activities. Our 2023 response activities included emergent and non-emergent requests for Emergency Medical Services, Fire Services, Public Assist Services, Mutual Aid Responses and Community Paramedic Services.










Fire and Rescue Calls for Service (CFS) Breakdown

Fire and Rescue Department Training

Fire and Rescue members participated in numerous training activities in 2023. Training is an essential component of preparedness to ensure the most efficient and effective service is delivered in our community. Operational members conducted and completed trainings to enhance fire knowledge and skills, EMS knowledge and skills, hazardous materials knowledge and skills, and several specialty hazard areas that fall under the responsibility of the fire department. Additionally, department officers conducted and completed officer and leadership training throughout the year.

Fire and Rescue External Stakeholder Training

Members of the Fire and Rescue department led or assisted with training across a broad spectrum of topics to bolster our risk reduction efforts in the community. These training sessions included joint efforts with our Department of Social Services partners on infant safe sleep considerations and fire extinguishers. CPR classes were held at the Innovation Center, the Rescue Mission, Winchester Public Schools and other city departments. Stop the bleed and Narcan administration classes were held for Winchester Public Schools, and fire safety awareness classes were held at local churches. Members assisted local businesses with industrial fire training at the training center, local academies with fire and EMS training, and community members with new parent child safety seat classes.







Community Risk Reduction (Fire Marshal Division)

Our fire marshals manage numerous annual inspections, re-inspections, new business inspections and fire protection system inspections throughout the year. Plan reviews are conducted for new buildings and fire protection systems. Fire investigations were conducted to identify causal factors after an incident, which helps drive our public education information to enhance risk reduction efforts. The smoke alarm program aids citizens in need by assessing their living environment and providing them with working smoke alarms. Risk reduction and operational members assisted with community canvassing throughout the year to offer home inspections that will reduce fire risk and fall risk for our senior citizens. This program has been well received and resulted in several home inspections. Our organization also partnered with the Red Cross for their "Sound the Alarm" event in 2023 to install smoke alarms throughout the city. The effort resulted in 130 installs in properties around the city.

Community Paramedic Program

The community paramedic program was implemented in 2022 to assist community members with a variety of needs that fall outside of normal fire and rescue operations. This program identifies clients with limited means and provides them with resources and options to enhance their physical health, mental health, addiction issues, and/or their living environments. The program has achieved great success thanks to all of our community partners and our dedicated community paramedic.




